


Ahead of the curve: 17 shapely new pieces

Looking for a way to break up the right angles of a boxy space? Lean into the rounded edges and graceful arches of these parabolic products that cut a striking silhouette in a sea of sharp corners.

- Both circular layers of the Jayna chandelier by <u>Crystorama</u> are wrapped in string and finished in a burnished silver for a subtle shimmer.
- 2. With sleek lines inspired by midcentury designer <u>Jean Royère</u>, the sloping back of Nathan Anthony's *Embrace* sofa lives up to its name by wrapping gently around the seat cushion.
- 3. Circular motifs adorn the rattan Seychelles daybed, part of Coastal Living's latest collection with Universal Furniture.
- 4. In Dôme Deco's F11-S2 coffee table, a conical steel base supports a gold-finished metal top with a delicate lip.
- 5. Like a line drawing come to life, Industry West's steel-framed *Amigo* chair is outfitted with a simple leather sling seat and back and wooden details that add warmth.
- 6. Inspired by a neck collar from a Metropolitan Museum of Art jewelry exhibit, the <u>Reed</u> rectangular dining table—part of <u>Jamie Drake</u>'s latest <u>collection for Theodore Alexander</u>—features a gilt finish on its oak veneer base.
- 7. The playful punched-out dots in the wrought iron Lapidus two-tiered chandelier, one of <u>Sasha Bikoff</u>'s <u>new confections</u> for <u>Currey & Company</u>, are illuminated to kaleidoscopic effect.
- The gold-glazed hollow center of the oblong Maire table lamp from Lite Source brings a metallic touch to the glossy black ceramic base.
- 9. Clad in navy velvet, the curved base of the Lauryn lounge chair by Sunpan mirrors the barrel-back seat.
- 10. An ivory concrete top and an hourglass-shaped base make the *Parrot* dining table from <u>Lillian August</u> for <u>Hickory</u> White a modern statement indoors or out.
- 11. Handcrafted from solid reclaimed elm, the stark, geometric <u>Keane bench</u> from <u>Four Hands</u> showcases the wood's knots and graining.
- A medley of shapes in the hand-embellished Powder Finger print by Evan Taylor for RFA Decor create a stylish abstract wall accent.
- 13. The simple lines of the *Valley* cocktail table by Hickory White make the elegant ash piece feel like the ultimate balancing act.
- 14. The antiqued finish of the cast resin Ibiza mirror by <u>Regina Andrew</u> highlights the imperfections of the original hand-carved form.
- 15. Modway's Isla dining chair features shiny brass legs, a curved seat frame and a channeled back.
- 16. The marble-topped Orsay cocktail table by Alfonso Marina is modeled on the asymmetrical form of an amoeba.
- 17. A belt of painted rattan brings a more relaxed feel to the classically inspired form of the *Narration* chair from <u>Caracole</u>'s latest <u>Modern collection</u>.

"I selected Hickory White's Aimee hall chest because of its decorative blue hand-painted hardware with a gold lining detail along the edge. I'm obsessed with statement hardware, and these oversized mod pulls stopped me in my tracks and truly take this piece to the next level."
